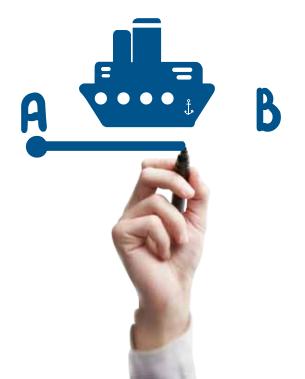




Market Overview



- Recent initiatives from the Government of India and Ministry of Shipping emphasizing the thrust on enhancing the scope of coastal shipping in India
- Prime Minister Narendra Modi himself taking reins of port infrastructure development initiative National Sagarmala Apex Committee (NSAC) shows the intent
- Ministry of Shipping has announced plans to revive 133 non-functional ports to boost coastal shipping
- Ministry of Shipping has accorded priority for berthing of coastal vessels at ports owned by the Indian government

- Direct Connectivity from Eastern and Southern coast of India to Middle East ports These actions, working in tandem, have yielded the desired results

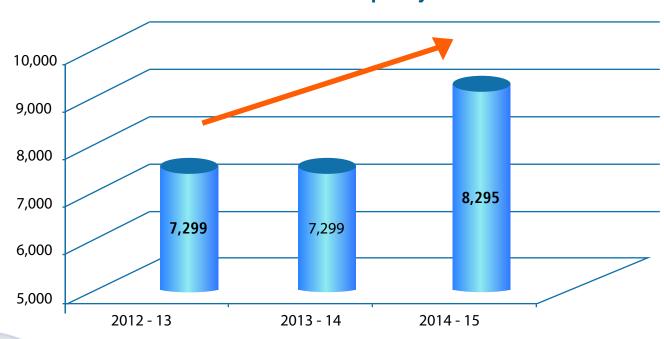

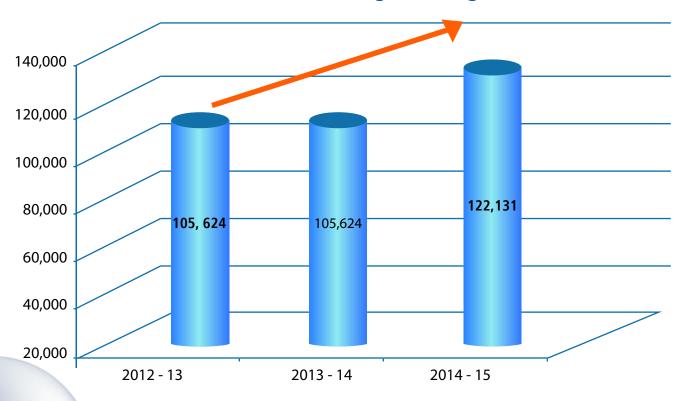

Deadweight Tonnage in MT

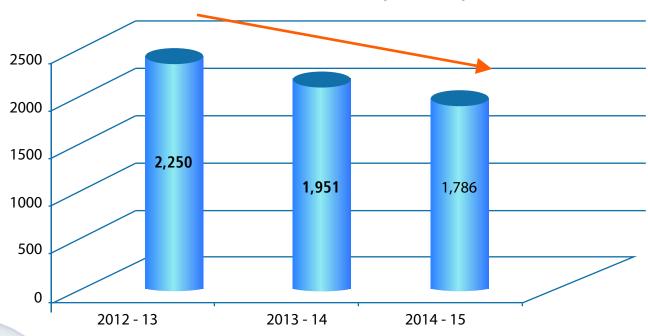

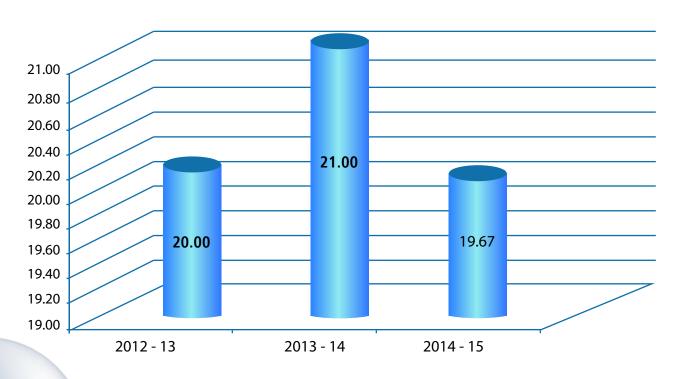

A Sea of Opportunities





- In India, presently less than 7% of domestic cargo moves through coastal route (China 30%, Europe 40%, US 21%), therefore huge potential for growth (railways 30%, roads 57%)
- Loss of life due to accidents in shipping is negligible compared with road and rail
- Huge growth potential and lower sea movement cost, augur well for the growth of coastal shipping in India

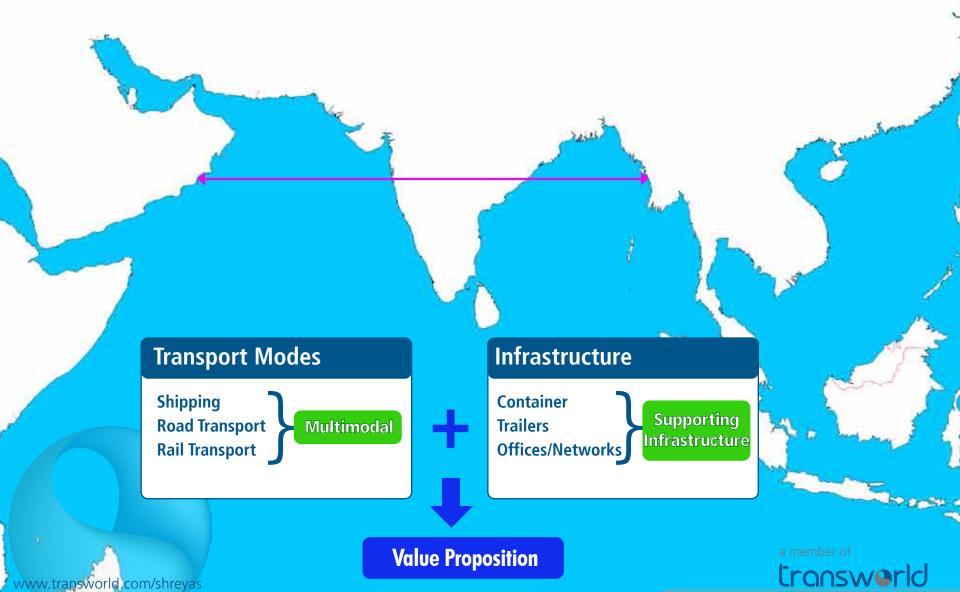

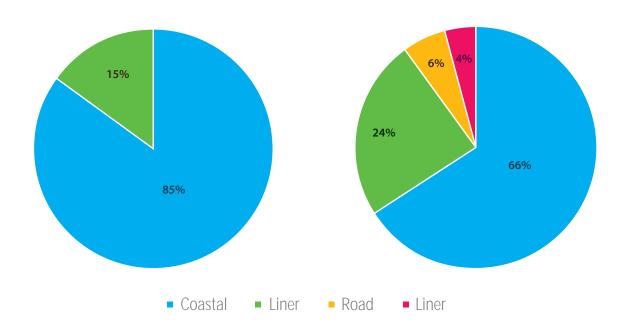

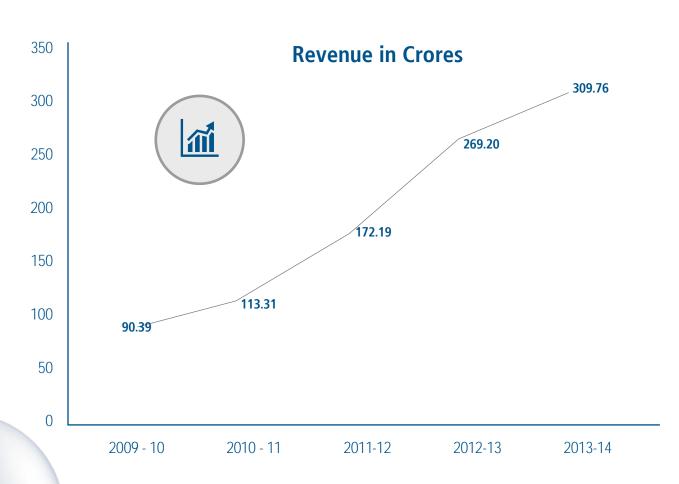
